For the sake of an expedited test distribution on the day of the forum, it is requested that each school create a list of which test each individual student wishes to take in addition to filling out the above form listing how many students total will be taking each test. Competition Rules

Academic Testing Rules:

- I. Students will need a #2 pencil to use for testing; pencils will be available if needed. Answer sheets are machine scored.
- II. Students are to put both name and school number on the answer sheets. The name of the test being taken must appear on the answer sheet.
- III. Please make sure students are taking the correct level tests.
- IV. Level 1/2 should only be taken by Middle School students who are in Latin and Level 1 should only be taken by Middle School students who have completed Latin 1.
- V. b. High School students who have not started Latin 2 yet may take Level 1 tests. Level 2 should only be taken by students who have not started Latin 3. Advanced tests are designed for Level 3 students and higher.
- VI. Please do not write on the testing materials. Answers filled out anywhere but the scantron sheet will not be graded.

Certamen:

- I. There is 1 moderator, 1 timekeeper, and 1 scorekeeper.
- II. A round consists of 10 toss-up questions and one bonus question for each correctly answered toss-up question.
- III. Each round has a limit of 10 minutes.
- IV. The person who presses the buzzer first must answer a toss-up question without consultation with other team members and must begin to answer within 5 seconds.
- V. A toss-up question is worth 10 points.

- VI. If a toss-up question is interrupted by a buzzer, the person pressing the buzzer must offer an answer without hearing the rest of the question. If the answer offered is incorrect, the question is repeated once in its entirety for the opposing teams to answer.
- VII. When a member of a team correctly answers a toss-up question, the moderator reads a bonus question for the team. The team may confer for 15 seconds after which the team captain must begin the answer.
- VIII. A bonus question is worth 10 points.
- IX. If a toss-up question has been asked and no one has signaled to answer, the moderator may repeat the question upon the request of any contestant.
- X. If no one signals to answer a toss-up question within 30 seconds, the moderator asks the next toss-up question.
- XI. Any member who is unable to hear the moderator should interrupt him immediately. The moderator will stop, and when the acoustical problems have been solved, he will start the question from the beginning.
- XII. If there is a tie at the end of a round, the moderator asks questions until the tie is broken.
- XIII. The moderator has the final authority in judging all aspects of the Certamen and settling any disputes which arise.

Chariot Races:

- I. One entry per school per race.
- II. The chariot must have 2 or four wheels, and it must have a handle for the rider.
- III. The rider must be wearing a helmet.
- IV. Students pulling the chariot must be wearing tennis shoes. No cleats or open-toed shoes.

Foot Races and Relays:

- I. Two entries per school per individual event.
- II. Runners must be wearing tennis shoes. No cleats or open-toed shoes.
- III. One team per team event: one all-female team and one all-male team.
- IV. 3 of the 4 team members must be from the same age division. (for example, a team with three 8th graders and one 9th grader would be considered a Junior team and a team with three 11th graders and one 6th grader would be considered a Senior team).

Costume Contest:

- I. A contestant may spend no more than \$25.00 per costume.
- II. The couple's costumes have a limit of \$50.00, including props.

- III. Contestants must present an itemized cost list and receipts.
- IV. No rented costumes or parts of costumes are permitted.
- V. Costumes are to be student-made. Family may help. The model does not have to be the maker.
- VI. The costume contest will be judged on the following criteria: authenticity, neatness, attractiveness, craftsmanship, creativity.
- VII. The contestant is NOT expected to make a brief statement about the costume and the character.

Additional Competition Rules:

- I. Please make sure your students compete at the correct level. Level 1 written tests should only be taken by students who have not yet begun Level 2. Level 2 written tests should only be taken by students who have not yet begun Level 3. Advanced tests may be taken by anyone, but they are designed for Level 3 students and higher. Certamen follows this same pattern.
- II. Please adhere to the limits for other contests (2 students per contest in most cases). If a school exceeds its allowed number of entries, no points will be awarded for that contest.

Rules for Running for Office:

- I. To run for Office and be considered officially nominated, candidates must pre-file with the Parliamentarian before February 21st. Nominations will only be taken from the floor in the case of a state of emergency (no pre-filed candidates for a particular Office).
- II. To be eligible for Office, a student must be enrolled in Latin, Greek, or a Classical Humanities class for the entire term of their Office or must have completed the highest level that is offered at their school.
- III. Only one person from each school may run for one specific Office. (Example: your school cannot have two people running for President, but your school may have one person running for President and a different person running for 1st Vice President).
- IV. No campaigning of any sort is allowed before the First General Assembly held at the Spring Forum.
- V. Speeches will be held during the First General Assembly and must not exceed one minute and thirty seconds.
- VI. Students may run for one of the following Offices: President, First Vice President; Second Vice President, Parliamentarian, Historian, or Editor.
